General Manager's Report November 10, 2014

GOVERNMENT AFFAIRS UPDATE

FEDERAL

Congress is currently in recess and will return for legislative business on November 12.

House and Senate appropriations staffers are quietly laying the groundwork for an ambitious wrap-up "omnibus" spending package that they hope will be considered during the lame duck session. However, given that the current Continuing Resolution expires on December 11, House and Senate leaders will have a small window of time to decide whether to shoot for an omnibus — or settle for another Continuing Resolution that lasts until early 2015 or through the end of the fiscal year. The path forward will not be known until Members return to Washington next week.

With Republicans winning control of the Senate, it could have significant implications for the transportation world in 2015. It is anticipated that, Senator Jim Inhofe (R-OK) would be poised to take control of the Environment and Public Works Committee and Senator Orrin Hatch (R-UT) would lead the Finance Committee in 2015, right as lawmakers are again faced with the challenge of reauthorizing and funding a long-term highway and transit bill.

In the House, there is likely to be less transition following the elections. However, the House Appropriations Transportation-HUD panel that controls DOT funding will see some major changes since the panel's top Republican and Democrat are retiring after this year. Chairman Tom Latham (R-IA) and ranking member Ed Pastor (D-AZ) are not running for reelection.

RT - ENTERTAINMENT AND SPORTS COMPLEX BUSINESS ADVISORY PANEL

RT Board Chair Phil Serna invited a handful of business leaders with interest in Downtown Sacramento to consider serving on an Advisory Panel. The Panel's purpose is to provide the Board, RT management and the general public, honest advice about how to improve the system. For many future Entertainment and Sports Complex (ESC) attendees their first encounter with the new experience won't be at the turnstiles of the arena. It will be using RT buses and light rail trains, in many instances for the first time. That means RT has to do things differently that complement the experience of a new, urban entertainment and sports complex. The following business leaders, each a major Stakeholder in the downtown area and beyond, has actively participated in this process.

The RT/ESC Business Panel has met three times: September 29th, October 20th, and November 5th. They have discussed a number of issues and ideas to improve operating and maintenance efficiencies, real and perceived safety issues, possible station/stop consolidations near the ESC, marketing and branding, and greater private citizen and private sector stakeholder support and involvement in RT.

Chair Serna and the RT/ESC facilitator Wendy Hoyt will make an oral presentation at the November 10th Board meeting. The Business Panel members will attend the December 8th Board meeting to present their findings and recommendations.

MILITARY DISCOUNT UPDATE

Recently a member of the public, Christian Wellisch, Army National Guard, requested that the Board consider offering a discount to members of the US Armed Forces. The reasons for offering a discount were summarized as follows: Improved public relations, other transit agencies offer discounts to US Armed members, increase in revenues, and improved security.

Staff researched other agencies' fare policies and found the following:

- Staff has completed a review of the Board-approved peer agencies and concluded that 2 of the 1712 peer agencies (17%) have some type of discount program in place for active or disabled veterans. See chart attached.
- Staff expanded the scope to include other agencies and found that 7 of 28 agencies, 2825%, have some type of discount program for members of the Armed Forces.

Currently RT does not have a military discount program, however in the past, RT had a retail outlet agreement in the VA hospital. Under this arrangement, RT provided media to the VA hospital at RT's full price, and staff at the hospital provided free or discounted media to their patients. Currently, California Veteran's Affairs has a similar program, whereby the agency purchases small quantities of daily passes directly from RT at full fare. The quantities are small because these purchases are made based on public donations.

According to the 2013 Bureau of Labor Statistics, there are an estimated 512 active duty members and 98,345 veterans in Sacramento County. Additionally, Sacramento County has a population of approximately 1,101,237 (18 years or older).

Due to the large number of veterans and the potential for lost revenue associated with providing a discount to this group of individuals, staff will focus attention on estimating the

fiscal impact for providing free or 50% discounts to active members of the US Armed Services. Additionally, prior to making any recommend fare changes, a Title VI analysis must be completed.

HIGH SCHOOL (OVER AGE 18) DISCOUNT UPDATE

RT staff is continuing to gather information about providing discounted fares to riders over the age of 18 whom are actively pursuing their High school diploma and providing free rides to all high school students.
